
DID YOU KNOW JOHN BUNYAN WAS A RINGER?



Born in Elstow, Beds on November 30, 1628

Fact 1: Followed his father's trade of a tinker

Fact 2: Rang the fourth bell of the Elstow ring

Fact 3: Gave up in case a bell fell on him!

He died of a fever on August 31, 1688





HAVE YOU HEARD OF BENJAMIN ANNABLE?



We don't know what he looks like. He was born in the late 1690s.

Fact 1: A baker by trade

Fact 2: Master of the College Youths in 1746

Fact 3: He conducted the first peal on 12 bells

He died on February 1, 1756





THIS IS SIR HENRY CHAUNCEY



He was born of an old Hertfordshire family in London in 1632

Fact 1: Judge and attorney-at-law

Fact 2: First General of The Esquire Youths

Fact 3: Last judge to sentence a witch to death

He died on May 21, 1719





THIS IS WILLIAM DOUBLEDAY CROFTS



He was born circa 1737

Fact 1: Solicitor and attorney-at-law

Fact 2: Composer/conductor/peal ringer

Fact 3: Mainstay of Society of Sherwood Youths

He died on November 29, 1809





THIS IS SAMUEL THURSTON



He was born in Norwich, February 19, 1789

Fact 1: He was a stonemason

Fact 2: Leading ringer of the Norwich Scholars

Fact 3: Memorial to him under Mancroft tower

He died on January 9, 1841





HENRY THOMAS ELLACOMBE



H. T. ELLACOMBE.

From a miniature painted in 1817

He was born on May 15, 1790, and this minature was painted in 1817.

Fact 1: Worked as an engineer with Brunel

Fact 2: Well-known priest/campanologist

Fact 3: Historian and writer of bell histories

He died on August 6, 1885





THIS IS ALICE WHITE



She was born in Basingstoke on October 8, 1880.

Fact 1: First lady to ring a tower bell peal

Fact 2: Emigrated as Mrs Sullivan to Canada

Fact 3: Lived a further 83 years after her first peal!

She died on August 25, 1979





MR AND MRS ROBERT WHITTINGTON



Robert was born in 1868 His wife was born in 1870

Fact 1: First married couple to ring a towerbell peal

Fact 2: Cycled to over 400 towers on their tandem


Fact 3: Recorded over 100,000 miles in doing so

Robert died June 1, 1957, his wife June 25, 1945





THIS IS JOHN DAY



This silhouette represents a man called John Day, born in 1749. (Not the John Day from Birmingham known to most ringers!)

Fact 1: Learned to ring at Bromley in 1773

Fact 2: A breeches-maker

Fact 3: Conducted the first eight peals of the Trinity


Youths

SIR ARTHUR PERCIVAL HEYWOOD



He was born in 1849, second son of Sir Thomas Heywood, Bart.

Fact 1: First President of Central Council (28 years)

Fact 2: Author, composer, peal ringer

Fact 3: Built 4 mile railway around his estate

He died April 20, 1916





ELSIE HAIRS née BENNETT



She was born in Guildford on October 22, 1892

Fact 1: Rang 75 peals in hand before first in tower

Fact 2: First lady to ring three peals in a day


Fact 3: College Youth in 1917

She died on May 20, 1969





A GREAT DEAL IS KNOWN ABOUT THE REVD. F. E. ROBINSON



He was born on January 16, 1833, and Vicar of Drayton, Oxon for 30 years

Fact 1: First man to ring 1,000 peals

Fact 2: Wrote a 637pp book on his life (pub 1908)

Fact 3: Excellent wood carver

He died on February 16, 1910





WE'RE SURE YOU'VE HEARD OF JASPER WHITFIELD SNOWDON



Born on June 18, 1844 second son of Revd John Snowdon, Vicar of Ilkley, Yorks

Fact 1: Excellent peal ringer and conductor

Fact 2: Author; co-founder of The Bell News

Fact 3: Good athelete; swimmer, climber

He died of typhoid fever on Nov. 16, 1885
